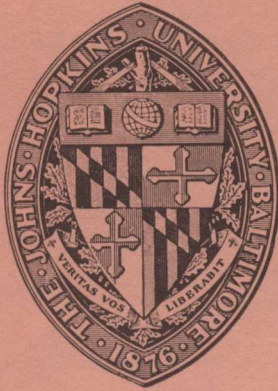

The Charm of OTHER-AGE MASTERPIECES

Cheselden: OSTEOGRAPHIA, or, The Anatomy of Bones

This deluxe replica edition of a rare volume from the mid 1700's contains exquisite drawings of complete skeletons and also of each individual bone of the human body. Additional representations range from the first appearance of ossification in the fetus to a variety of diseased bones. Saunders has prepared this limited edition on heavy, custom-made paper, and each boxed copy is individually hand-crafted in a deluxe quarter leather binding. 114 pp. 13 1/4" x 18 1/8". \$125. Smellie: A SET OF ANATOMICAL TABLES with Explanations and an Abridgement of the Practice of Midwifery

This magnificent reprint of a mid-17th century volume reveals the skills, practices and instruments used by one of the earliest English teachers of male midwifery. In 39 large and meticulously drawn plates, the author shows views of the normal and abnormal pelvis, the uterus and fetus, various stages of pregnancy and fetal presentations. 116 pp. 12 1/8" x 18 1/8". \$140. Kaplan: Weitbrecht's SYNDESMOLOGY

Originally published in 1742, this remarkable classic contains a rare collection of 82 detailed engravings and illustrations of the ligaments of the human body. Accompanying each, is a precisely written description of its form, color, connection, insertion and function. Though over 200 years old, the book presents many modern concepts of value to physicians today. 197 pp., illus. \$30. Just Ready.

Meade: An Introduction to the HISTORY OF GENERAL SURGERY

This unusual new history of surgery is concerned not with the story of the surgeons themselves, but with the surgery they performed—from the earliest flint knife operations up to and including the recent breakthroughs in organ transplantation.
