



Cover Illustration: Wood engraving of Geneva Medical Institution, pioneer medical school of Western New York. In its 38 years (1835-72), the school graduated 695 doctors, many of whom practiced in the area, and one of whom, Elizabeth Blackwell, was the first woman to receive an M.D. degree. Other illustrations relate to the College of Physicians and Surgeons of the Western District, at Fairfield, the first medical school in upper New York State (1812-42); to the City Hospital for Women, a private gynecological hospital in Buffalo (c. 1908); and to H.H. Warner, Rochester's late 19th Century proprietary promoter whose manufactory still stands across the river from the hotel. (From Edward G. Miner Library.)


